My Senior Cat

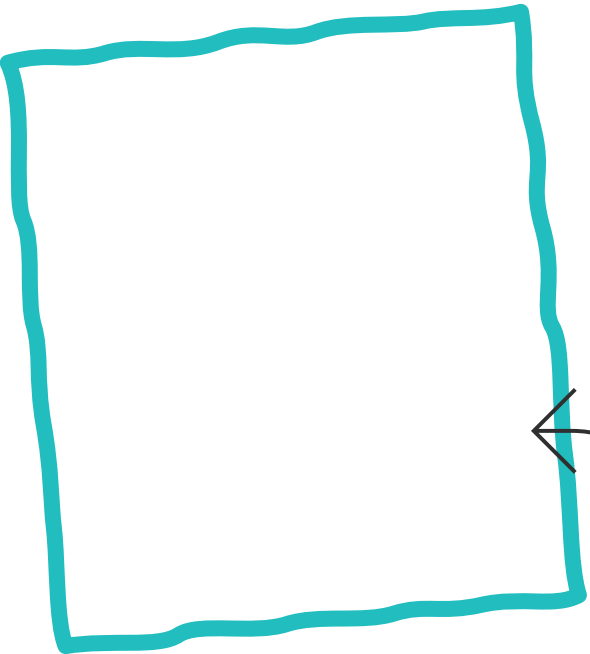


A senior cat is one that is getting older.

As pets get older, they may need a little more care, and we are here to help you and your furry senior continue to be the best of friends.

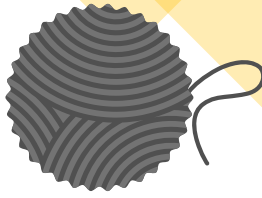

A senior cat may want to take it easy, this could mean that they need more time alone to rest.

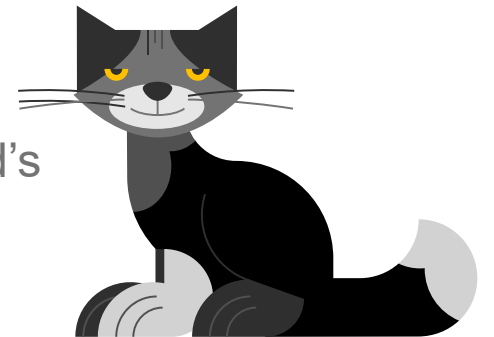

That's why it is important to remember the Vetsure Kids **Golden Rule** which is:

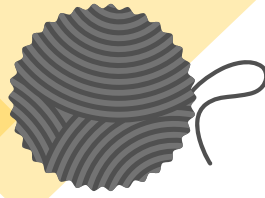
"If you should not do it to a friend at school, then you should not do it to your pet."

Caring for your Senior Cat



- ✓ All pets need food and water – you can make sure your cat has fresh water every day and that you feed them the right kind of cat food. Make sure not to feed your cat human food as it can make them quite poorly.
- ✓ Your senior cat will really love having a comfy bed and a quiet place to go if they need to. If your cat is in their bed or in a favourite quiet spot, then they may need some time to themselves, so be sure to give them space and leave them alone.
- ✓ Some senior cats may have achy bones, this happens sometimes as they get older. They may even need medicine every day to stop them aching. It is very important if your cat is achy or uncomfortable not to hug them tightly or pull them about. You may think you are being kind, but it could accidentally hurt them.
- ✓ Some senior pets can become a bit grouchy sometimes. It is always a good idea to let them have time to work through how they are feeling by themselves.

When your cat is asleep, try not to disturb them. Even cats need quiet time sometimes

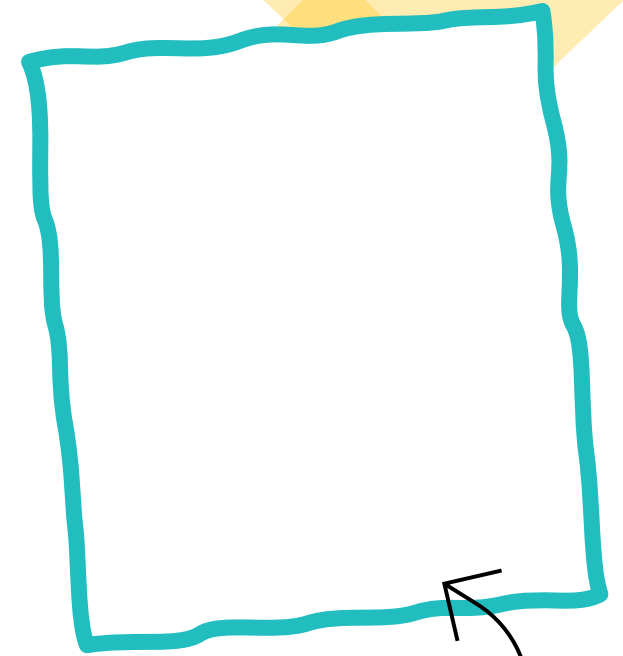


Being Safe with Medicine

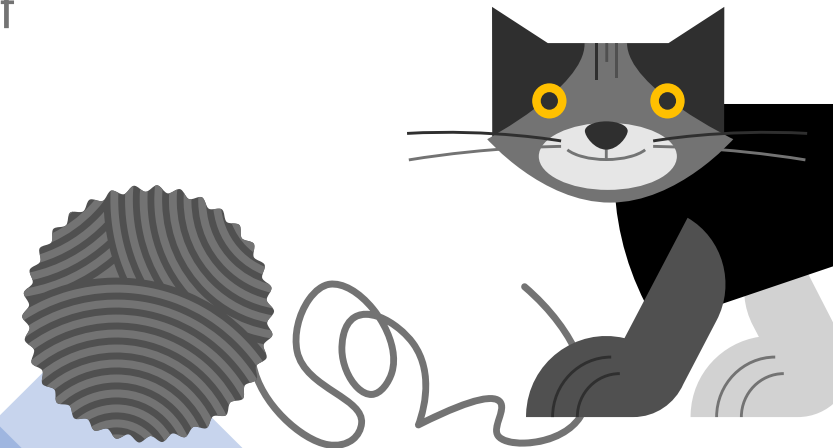
Sometimes senior cats will need to take medicine every day for all sorts of reasons. This medicine will have been chosen by your vet and is perfect for your pet!

Here are some rules about medicine:

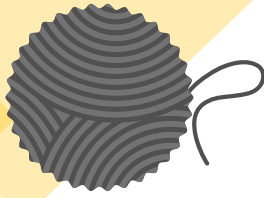
- You must never touch your pet's medicine as it can be dangerous for children.
- Medicine should only be given to your pet by a grown-up.
- The medicine for your pet should be kept in a cupboard out of the way.
- If you ever find your pet's medicine, you should tell an adult who can put it away in a safe place.

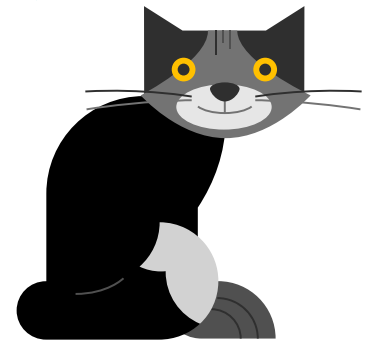
