## My Pet's Festive Holiday

#### The Trouble with Decorations

Here's how we can keep your pet safe:

- Don't put chocolate decorations on your tree. Chocolate is really poisonous to pets. They don't seem to mind that chocolate is dangerous because it is yummy. If you see your pet eat any chocolate, tell a grown-up right away.
- Tree lights can be very pretty, but to some pets they look like something fun to chew. This can be dangerous and may zap them if they break the wires. If you see your pet chewing the wires, tell a grown-up right away!
- Cats love climbing trees, but the one in our house is not a playground and could easily fall over. If the tree lands on you or your cat, it may really hurt. If your cat is being cheeky, tell a grown-up right away.
- Presents under the tree risk being opened by cheeky pets, so make sure they can't get to them.





# and Tasty Treats



With all the tasty food about it's no wonder our pets want a bite to eat, but a lot of the time the tasty food we eat can be dangerous to pets.



Let's look at the safety rules for food:

- Chocolate and Christmas cake with raisins are very poisonous, so make sure you don't feed it to your pets, no matter how much they would like some!
- A turkey dinner may be tasty, and you may want to give your pet a plate of food, but this may be too much for their tummies to deal with and could make them poorly. It is best to stick to their usual pet food!



### A Silent Night

You may find your house is a little louder, there may be more visitor's, carol singers, as well as noisy toys.

Some pets will love all the fuss that comes with the festive holidays, but sometimes all the people and noise can be worrying for them.

Here are some tips to help nervous pets with the festivities:
